Fallopian Tube - Eggs pass from the ovaries, through the fallopian tubes, to the uterus.
Discharge - Vaginal discharge is fluid secreted from tiny glands in the vagina and cervix.
Fertilisation - is the fusion of the nucleus of a male gamete with the nucleus of a female gamete.
